



In future years the pattern of each life will grow and change, but we hope that what is woven here will reflect honor upon our school.






Seldom . . .

Story of the Washington Trip

In the early hours of the morning of April 11, 1950 a group of excited seniors were eagerly waiting for the bus to arrive. At 7:00 we, the Senior Class of 1950, were on our way to Washington.

After crossing the Delaware River by ferry, we stopped in Baltimore, Maryland, at the fashionable Southern Hotel. Here we had an enjoyable lunch and it was a pleasure to be waited on.

As we approached Washington at 6:00 P.M. it was a very inspiring sight to see the Capitol as the center of attraction. A sight like this made us all proud to feel that we were Americans.

We arrived at the Hotel Martinique, a tired and hungry group of individuals. We were assigned our rooms, and after a refreshing pause, we were told that we were going to dine when ready. That evening several of us stayed at the hotel while others went swimming at the Hotel Ambassador, and still others went for walks or sight-seeing.

On the first day we were called at approximately 7:00 A.M. and told to be down for breakfast at 7:30 A.M. After breakfast we began our first tour to the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. Here we saw paper money being made, unfortunately, we couldn't obtain any souvenirs. Next we visited the United States Capitol, where we viewed the President's rooms, the room where the House of Representatives meets, where the Senate meets and the room where Congress convenes. After this tour through the Capitol we had our class picture taken, with the Capitol dome in the background.

After dinner we traveled on to the Lincoln Memorial, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, where we saw how the F.B.I. apprehends dangerous public enemies. Our last tour was the Arlington National Cemetery, to see the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. A few steps in back of the Tomb was the National Memorial Amphitheatre made completely of marble. This was a beautiful sight since the sun was shining directly on the marble. After having supper at the hotel we all visited the Congressional Library. This was an educational tour as well as an enjoyable one. We then ventured

on to an amusement park where everyone had the time of their lives.

Thursday morning we toured the Supreme Court Building which is also pure white marble. We visited the Mellon Art Gallery, the Smithsonian Institute and later, the Washington Monument which is 555 feet high and has 900 steps. The class decided to go in to see the inside of this famous monument; some of us walked up the steps and others who were smart took the elevator! As the students were ascending the stairs one by one they passed John Thorogood and Yvonne Bolton who were helping each other to climb the 900 steps. We all took the elevator down except for two brave people Emily Spillane and Roy DuJat who with inexhaustible determination walked down the steps and all the way to the bus. After a delicious lunch at the hotel we again started our touring. We visited Annapolis and some of the girls were fortunate enough to take pictures of some of the officers. We then journeyed on to the Franciscan Monastery which was of high interest to most of us. There were numerous altars, some underground and our guide also showed us the catacombs. This was of great importance to us since we all wondered how early worshippers of the Christian faith behaved.

Friday morning we started out for Hotel York-towne in York Pennsylvania. We ate lunch in the Francis Scott Key Hotel and later toured Gettysburg, We finally arrived at the hotel, ate dinner and got ready for an evening of fun. We had a party and afterward went out for a snack.

On Saturday morning we all realized that a perfect week had come to a close. On the way home we toured Valley Forge and Independence Hall, had dinner at a Horn and Hardart Restaurant and later stopped at a Howard Johnson Restaurant for a snack. We arrived in Central Islip at 8:40 P.M., happy to be home again. The class gave three rousing cheers for Miss Mannix, Mr. Shertenlieb, Mr. Markey and for the bus driver, Nick. We shall hold this memory in our minds as long as we live and with deepest appreciation we, the Seniors of 1950, want to thank all those people who made it possible for us to go.

C. I. SHADOWS


The "C. I. Shadows", our monthly school paper, has served its purpose very well. It has contained interesting and valuable information intermingled with fun and humor.





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
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
