SPANISH CLUB

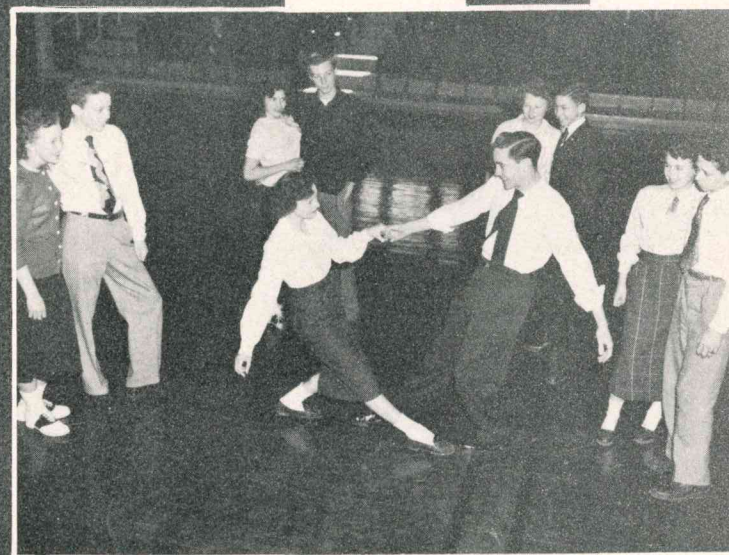

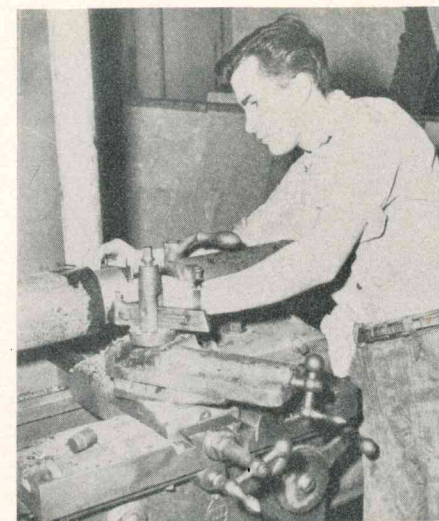

Here are some of our students who have made this transition early; they are still at school while maintaining jobs in our town.

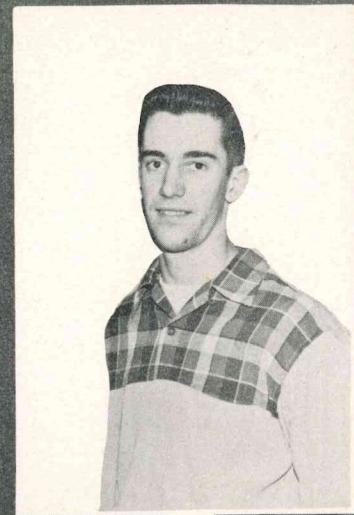

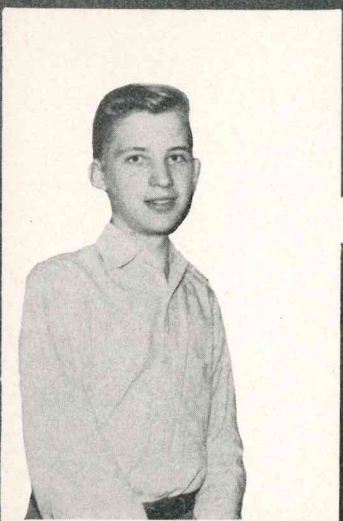

S O C C E R

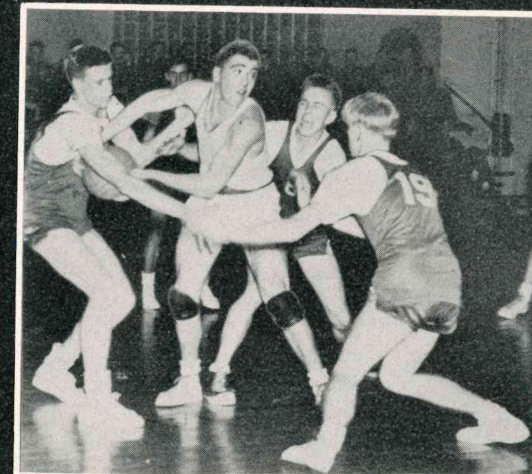

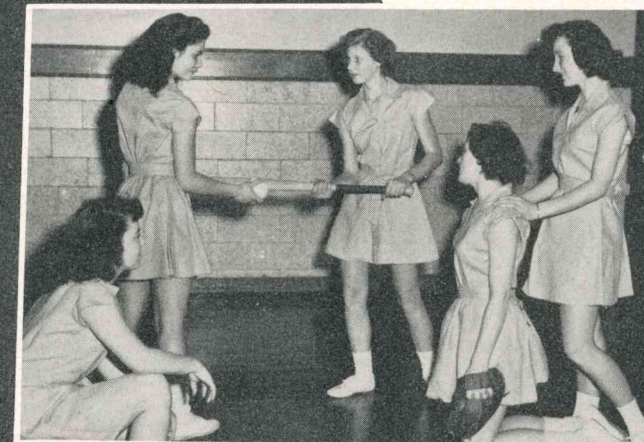


J. V. CHEERLEADERS
