


MISS MARGUERITE L. MULVEY, in appreciation for 35 years of unselfish, loyal service to the children of Central Islip.


### OUR JANITORIAL STAFF


### SECRETARIES

Learning the mysteries of good photography has been the goal of these club members and well have they learned their task. One glance at the finished product proves that membership was not in vain.




# Glee Club


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# Volleyball




Coach Barlin contributes hustling and fine team-play as two of the main reasons for the team's fine success.

Next season every one of these boys will return, therefore it is quite safe to say that we may anticipate a very successful gridiron season.








The Basketball team at Central Islip High this year was terrific! Basketball has always been a favorite sport with the kids and this year was no exception.



# Baseball Team





# Track Team




Central Islip's 1957 track team was a spirited and hustling one, and showed a great deal of promise.
